### Kaiser seniors enjoy graduation at new stadium

He said last year's graduation ceremony was held on a dead soccer field and that the bleachers were rickety. "It was sad," he said.

But there was nothing sad about the early evening of June 11, as happiness and excitement vibrated through the line of seniors.

When the seniors started to walk through the gate, Jamie Barela's smile reflected pride in his success of what he was about to receive. He said he is the youngest of three kids in his family and the first one to graduate.

"It's kind of crazy, but it's cool," he said. "They didn't think I'd make it."

Jamie said he plans to attend a trade school and work as a machinist.

Martha Martinez teaches Spanish and English at Kaiser, and said she is especially proud of one student who is graduating because he is already a father.

"He has a two-year-old daughter and he's never left the program," she said. "For him, that's a big struggle."
