HIGHLIGHTS

Southridge Middle School has been selected as a **2018 Microsoft Showcase School** for its commitment to providing student access to digital platforms and bridging the technology gap. Southridge is one of 40 schools in the country to be named a Showcase School this year and joins a global community of schools dedicated to pursuing innovative technologies for bolstering student achievement.

In the 2018-19 school year, Dorothy Grant and Chaparral Elementary Schools became the first **Code to the Future** schools in the Inland Empire, offering immersive computer science curriculum for students in Transitional Kindergarten through fifth grade. Code to the Future engages students in technology- and coding-based lessons integrated into daily instruction and core subjects.

Jurupa Hills High School offers a two-year **International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme**. Those who successfully complete the program receive an additional IB diploma recognized, and respected internationally. There are currently 50 juniors and seniors working toward the full diploma. In May of 2018, the Jurupa Hills senior class received 5 IB Diplomas and another 123 juniors and seniors earned certificates (course candidates). The 128 students who tested, took 281 total tests; of those tests, 169 tests earned scores of 4 or better.

FUSD buses travel approximately 2,340 miles daily to transport an average of 4,924 students. In the 2017-18 school year, buses transported students to 1,170 field trips, covering 97,915 miles.
