Activities should take 15-30 minutes.



<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Sorting Sense</u></b></p> <p>Collect, different objects from around the house and classify how they are the same or different (colors, size, shape, texture.)</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Rainbow Writing</u></b></p> <p>Help them to write their names and then have them trace it with different color crayons or markers.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Me and my Family</u></b></p> <p>Encourage your child to draw a picture of their family and help them by writing what they are doing on the picture. Help them to write their name on their picture.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Play Board Games</u></b></p> <p>Find your favorite board game and play as a family. Board games practice many important skills such taking turns, counting, matching, and especially that it is OK if you don't always win. It was playing that was fun.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>How do you feel?</u></b></p> <p>Discuss with your child how he/she feels at school and share your feelings about them attending school. Fold a paper in half and each of you draw about what you said.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Self-Dress</u></b></p> <p>Allow your child to choose their outfit for the day. Have them describe each clothing item and share why they choose those items.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Book Making</u></b></p> <p>Help your child make a book about buildings and who lives or works in them. Have them draw the pictures and you can write the words that they tell you. Help them to understand a story has a beginning, middle, and end.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>More or Less</u></b></p> <p>Using any small items that can be counted. Give yourself and child your own piles of items. Guess &amp; count who has more, less or same amounts.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>What lives in a Tree</u></b></p> <p>Draw pictures of what lives in trees and discuss them with your child.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Shapes</u></b></p> <p>With supervision and child scissors, cut a variety of shapes out of paper. Have your child build a building out of the shapes. Describe each shape. How many sides does it have? How many corners? Which are longer or shorter?</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Counting and sorting Toys</u></b></p> <p>Have your child count and sort their toys. Make a graph that shows how many of each different type of toy. After have your child clean up and them away in their appropriate places.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Body Patterns</u></b></p> <p>Create a pattern using body movements. Have your child copy you: Clap your hands, stomp your feet, clap your hands, stomp your feet, etc.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Make your own activity</u></b></p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Build and Learn</u></b></p> <p>Give your child different objects to build with, and ask your child to explain to you what they are building.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>My Favorite Activity</u></b></p> <p>Ask your child to draw a tree and describe the parts of the tree.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Tall Talk</u></b></p> <p>Line up family members and talk about who is tallest. Then have your child line their stuffed animals up from smallest to tallest.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Simon says Draw!</u></b></p> <p>Play a family game with your child. Use paper and crayons and give directions to only draw something when you say Simon says. "Simon says draw a dog" If you say draw a flower, they should not draw anything.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Counting Blocks</u></b></p> <p>Cut out squares and number them from 1-10. Mix them up and then help your child put them in order.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Draw a picture</u></b></p> <p>Talk to your child about their classroom and friends. Encourage them to draw a picture of their favorite activity they did at school.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Mealtime</u></b></p> <p>At mealtime have your child help by setting the table for lunch or dinner or help you cook.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>I Caught the Ball</u></b></p> <p>You and your child can play catch and count how many times they caught the ball.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Play Simon Says</u></b></p> <p>Play Simon Says to practice with your child following directions. You be Simon and give your child silly directions such as "Simon says hop like a bunny." Simon says rub your tummy"</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>House Hunt</u></b></p> <p>Hide objects around the house. Have your child count and match how many they can find.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>What's Missing?</u></b></p> <p>Choose 5 different items and show them to your child. After, lay them out for display and tell your child to close their eyes. Take one away and have your child guess what's missing.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Alphabet Memory Game</u></b></p> <p>Write uppercase letters on index cards and do the same for the lowercase letters. Turn all the letters upside down. Help your child learn to match the uppercase letter to the lowercase letter.</p>
