








Aging Facilities in Need of Repair

More than half of our schools are over 30 years old and 16 of our schools are 50 years old or older, and do not meet today's evolving education standards. Outdated security and safety features, as well as aging portable classrooms that have only one or two electrical outlets, are inadequate for a modern learning environment and negatively impact student safety, learning and achievement.

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Preserving Core Academics and a Well-Rounded Education in the FUSD Community

Potential Bond Measure to Protect Quality Education and Safe Learning Environments

To keep pace with academic standards and improve student safety and security, Fontana Unified School District is considering placing a bond measure on the November 2022 ballot. The measure could generate up to \$349 million for school facilities projects and cost property owners within the district approximately \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed (not market) value while bonds are outstanding.

If approved, bond funds could be used to:



Repair leaky roofs and remove asbestos, lead paint and mold



Keep schools safe and secure



Provide early childhood classrooms for all children under 4 years old at every school site by 2025



Prevent overcrowding by providing additional schools and classrooms



Help prepare our students for 21st century jobs and careers



Build science, technology, engineering and math labs

Strict Fiscal Accountability

A potential locally controlled bond measure would include strict fiscal accountability protections including an independent citizen's oversight committee and annual audits. By law, no funds could be used for administrator salaries or benefits.
